1,506 children received a supportive adult role model through Big Brothers Big Sisters

5,484 boys participated in Boy Scouts

2,363 students participated in a Life/Skills Training program through Carroll Institute's Project Awareness

345 children were provided a volunteer advocate, who served on the child's behalf through the overburdened juvenile court system through Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA)

3,049 seniors were provided nutritional meals in their homes allowing them to maintain a healthy and independent lifestyle through Meals on Wheels

79 seniors with social, cognitive, or physical limitations were given support through Day Break

416 seniors were able to continue living independently with the help of volunteers who complete light household chores and provide transportation through Workers on Wheels

16,621 children were given the opportunity to participate in Character Counts!, a youth development opportunity

1,024 families were provided safe shelter at Children's Inn when fleeing from a domestic abuse situation

2,296 families were able to stay in their homes through assistance from Community Outreach

1 child was provided safe after-school care through Dell Rapids Community Haven

81 families were provided the needed step between homelessness and long-term housing through St. Francis House.

5,985 children received books from Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, a program that provides the opportunity for children 5 years of age and under to receive a book each month

266 expectant mothers with limited resources received home visits from nurses during pregnancy and after delivery through the BrightStart Program.

291 children with an incarcerated parent were provided support groups, family events and summer camp scholarships through Family Connection

289 individuals and families attained the skills to improve their earning power and end welfare dependency through Family Self Sufficiency

8,445 people received counseling through Family Service

677 children were able to visit with family members in a safe, supervised atmosphere at the Family Visitation Center

2,329 families received furniture through the Furniture Mission

2,018 girls participated in scouting

186 families with children were provided transitional housing through Heartland House

1,169 youth received educational, musical, cultural and creative opportunities at the Bowden Youth Center

38,735 individuals received referral information through the HelpLine Center's 211

86 disabled children were provided with after-school and summer care through Here4Youth
